What's the World Water Wedding?

What's the Point?

For everyone around the world to **publically** commit to water for life, because water is life!

Launch: **Sun 24 Aug** - announce your engagement / commitment to water.

Followed by a month of actions to promote this campaign between **Sun 24 Aug** to **Sun 28 Sept**.

Then nurture your relationship with your chosen water source and make the campaign go global. A day of water commitment ceremonies and weddings across the world on **Sun 22 Mar 2026**.

The initial idea of a 'wedding' was [inspired by Meg, an artist from Bristol](#). The XR Dirty Water team have created this action pack to support you in getting involved by creating your own actions and events around water.

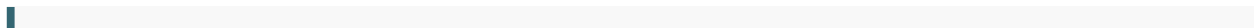
Key dates and calendar of actions and events.

Marriage vows often include a commitment to love 'for better or worse, in sickness and in health'. The World Water Wedding will both celebrate this miraculous basis of life and grieve the sickness facing many of our bodies of water.

Find Your Flow

There are many ways that you can be involved in the World Water Wedding; from organising a joyous hand-fasting / commitment / ceremony, through to NVDA actions, such as occupations, blockades, mass trespass and Citizen's Arrests and anything in between.

The World Water Wedding can apply to any body of water, from the smallest puddle to the biggest ocean. The Earth is mostly made up of water; rain, glaciers, the polar icecaps, springs, mist and much more are all part of our global water cycle. Despite this, only 2.5% of it is freshwater, and less than 1% is easily accessible and safe for humans to use.

Ambition

The campaign will build through 2025 and 2026 to a global day of action and weddings on **Sun 22 March, to coincide with World Water Day**. Everyone around the world commits to water for life.

Key campaign dates are deliberately connected to international water dates, which helps to bring media attention to water-related activities.

In 2023 Meg, inspired by the [Conham Bathing Campaign](#) in Bristol UK, organised a wedding ceremony to symbolise her commitment to the River Avon. The ceremony was a unique way to draw attention to the problem of sewage pollution in the River Avon and to advocate for cleaner water.

By ‘marrying’ the river, Meg aimed to create a sense of guardianship and inspire others to take action. The wedding was filmed as part of the documentary ‘[Rave On for the Avon](#)’ - watch the trailer above.

Meg subsequently appeared on ‘[This Morning](#)’ to share her story.

What's the Point?

For everyone around the world to **publically** commit to water for life!

Engagement is an emotional involvement or commitment. We're asking everyone to choose a water source and over the next seven months, nurture our relationships in the build up to a wedding or commitment ceremony on Sunday 22 March 2026.

You can do this as an individual, as a group of friends, or even as an entire XR local group. The aim is to inspire ourselves to become emotionally involved with our water source and find ways to protect, clean, honour, promote and care for water, as it sustains all life.

Share your commitment on social media and with friends and family. How are you going to build your relationship with your water source before the wedding in March 2026? How can you start to honour your commitment through action to protect and care for your chosen 'partner'?

Action Ideas

Below you'll find loads of ideas that you can develop for a month of actions. Let's flood the country with watery resistance!!

All Porpoise Actions

A range of fun, creative, versatile and family-friendly actions from poo-themed to making art with withy to old favourites like the Crime Scene! Take your pick [here](#).

Blockades

Physically block entrances to offices, HQs, water authorities, factory farms, landfill sites and sewage treatment plants with a [blockade](#).

Call the Alarm, Pan-Demonium Cacerolazo and Charivari

On bridges, seawalls reservoirs, flood zones we need to be seen and heard from the source of the rivers to the sea and along the coasts. Using voices, sirens, alarms, car horns, fog horns, whistles, church bells tolling, pan-demonium, lights projected, flares, drums, pots and pans.

This is something that people with children or caring responsibilities, people with disabilities, or those who do not have access to transport, can still join in with. Taking inspiration from the Cacerolazo seen regularly in the Spanish-speaking world, people will stand on doorsteps or at windows with candles and torches and with pots, pans and wooden spoons and make a noise.

Catch of the Day

You can take this action to any door including regulators, the Environment Agency or your water company. And include more spicy elements as and when you want to.

Citizen's Arrests

Citizen's Arrests can be used to hold those responsible to account. Got a 'Water Criminal' in mind? Then you will find enlightening information in this private security company's guide to [Citizen's Arrests UK Law and Know Your Rights](#) and inspiration from the [Citizen's Arrest Network \(CAN\)](#).

The criminals responsible for filling our rivers with shit and the seas with plastic have been hiding behind big companies for too long. We can no longer stand by as crimes are committed. It's time to hold these criminals to account. (CAN)

We're committing to water for life so why won't others? Create a dilemma - if those in power won't commit then perform a citizen's arrest.

Dilemmas

Ask the Water Authorities CEOs, Local Authority or Devolved Government (in the lead-up to the 2026 elections) to commit to water and publish their vows. If they do, they can be held to

their promises and if they refuse, why won't they commit? See the Citizen's Arrest action above to hold them to account.

Great UK WaterBlitz

From Friday 19th - Monday 22nd September, the [Great UK WaterBlitz](#) is a biannual campaign calling on everyone to go out and test the quality of their local freshwater including rivers, streams and lakes. This helps to build a national picture of water quality across the UK. The Great UK WaterBlitz is part of Earthwatch Europe's ongoing [FreshWater Watch](#) citizen science monitoring programme.

Mass Trespass

[Right to Roam](#) have loads of information on taking action through trespass.

Their vision is of a future countryside in which people not only enjoy the physical, mental and spiritual benefits of nature but serve as its guardians too.

The right to roam is the right to reconnect.

Claim back your right to access our waterbodies and hold your ceremonies wherever you want!

Occupations

[Occupations](#) target the 'bad guys' directly in their workplace. They are one of the more 'spicy' NVDA options but can be very high profile. Group bookings are an option at some water treatment plant open day events; get your list of sticky questions ready for your water company's (PR) tour guide. Arm yourselves with data using Dirty Water's [Knowledge is Powerful](#) and [Data Stream](#).

Paint the Streets

Paint the Streets is an ongoing creative campaign, breaking social norms to raise awareness about the climate & ecological emergency. It includes a variety of low-risk actions including murals, stickering, flyposting, stencilling, chalking, banner drops and the subvertising of bus stops & billboards. And the Dirty Water campaign have created a special **Fishy Business** paint-the-streets pack to shine a light on every **Dirty Water Source**.

Seeds in Leaves

Closing Ceremonies

World Rivers Day - Sun 28 Sept

Let's close off this month of action with a bang.

World Rivers Day is a celebration of the world's waterways. It highlights the many values of rivers and strives to increase public awareness and encourages the improved stewardship of rivers around the world.

You could also close off with an ending, commitment or water ceremony and remind everyone that **water is life**.

You can delve in to the **resources** to find ideas to help you create a ceremony or you can use any of the ideas **suggested for the rest of the month of action**.

If you're feeling more negative and would rather mark the sad deterioration of your water source, you might also like to hold a funeral, or similar. Use this to spur you on to take local action to start to get your water source cleared up by creating noise and tackling your local water company. Then you can celebrate your progress at your **Water Wedding in March 2026**.

You can also leave bells and natural confetti such as petals, near the water source, or tie things like old boots (river rubbish) to things around town - or outside your local water company! Or why not set up a **'Catch of the Day'** stand, to display all the litter you've found in and around your water source?

Let's close off this month of action with noise, colour, engagement and the enthusiasm to spend the next seven months working towards the world celebration of water in March.

Commitment | Wedding Day

Sunday 22 March 2026

The [World Water Day 2026](#) theme will focus on the vital role of water in achieving gender equality, highlighting how water access and management impact women and girls throughout their lives. The theme emphasizes the need for policies and programs to be tailored to the evolving needs of women and girls, from childhood to older age, ensuring inclusivity and effectiveness.

World Water Day, held on 22 March every year since 1993, is an annual United Nations Observance focusing on the importance of freshwater.

World Water Day celebrates water and raises awareness of the 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water. It is about taking action to tackle the global water crisis. A core focus of World Water Day is to support the achievement of [Sustainable Development Goal 6: water and sanitation for all by 2030](#).

What Can a Water Ceremony Bring?

Ceremony brings people into a deeper connection with water, which can be moving and uplifting. It can bring a deeper dimension to an action, so you can better:

- Create an emotional connection with your local water bodies.
- Connect with the emotions you feel to drive change. Preserve them as your source of hope.

- Continuous outreach - engage your community in devising and publicising your ceremony, then invite the wider public to your event.
- Develop and strengthen relationships with other groups.
- Build a common community purpose.
- Influence local authorities and regulatory organisations.
- Bring people to your Community Assembly.
- Raise awareness and promote [Water Pressure - Citizens' Assembly on Water](#).
- Filming your ceremony and sharing it as widely as possible can cultivate a greater connection to the issues and inspire others.

Create a Water Ceremony

Resources for your ceremony including [songs](#), [vows](#), [posters](#), [flyers](#).

Throughout history, we have always held ceremonies and rituals. They are our means of celebrating, marking moments, or making sense of the world we experience. For example, events such as naming ceremonies, funerals and unions (marriages), or more frequently, a football match or gig, are all a form of ritual where we share our feelings. They can include performance and express a sense of mourning or appreciation. Ceremonies are sacred. They are powerful.

Water is sacred in many cultures. Water is fundamental to life. Wherever clean water flows, life grows. Water represents emotions, renewal and life, which all ebb and flow. Constantly evolving, ebbing and flowing, it reminds us that we can too.

How can you connect with your emotions to truly embody water in this ceremony?

For inspiration, watch [Sacred Rivers](#) with Simon Reeve, a BBC TV mini-series that explores three of the world's major rivers: the Nile, Yangtze, and Ganges. Simon takes us on an exploration into the spiritual and cultural significance of the rivers delving into the beliefs, cultures, and traditions that surround them.

A water wedding or ceremony symbolise commitment to protecting and celebrating bodies of water. Some examples are:

Knot-Tying Unity Ceremony

Getting married is called "[tying the knot](#)" for a reason. If you're looking for a symbolic wedding unity idea, literally tie a knot to signify your bond. We recommend using a fisherman's knot to tie a piece of rope—not only is it the strongest knot, it gets tighter with pressure, making it a beautiful representation of your relationship.

You can also integrate a ceremony or ritual, like a [Unity Sand](#) ceremony, [water blending ceremony](#) or [water rituals](#), to visually represent your union.

Hand Fasting Ceremony

"[Hand Fasting](#)" is similar to knot tying. It can be adapted by using and sharing a garland and then allowing the river to accept some of the flowers and the union.

Blessing Stones

Celtic weddings were often near water. Guests could offer a special pebble as a gift to the river and make a wish as they cast it in.

Spring Equinox

The commitment day comes just after the Spring Equinox (20th-21st March). The spiritual meaning of the spring equinox is deeply rooted in themes of balance, renewal, and transformation. This celestial event marks the moment when day and night are equal in length, symbolizing harmony between light and dark. Across cultures, the equinox has long been recognized as a powerful time for growth, reflection, and new beginnings. Symbols of new beginnings can include decorated eggs and spring flowers.

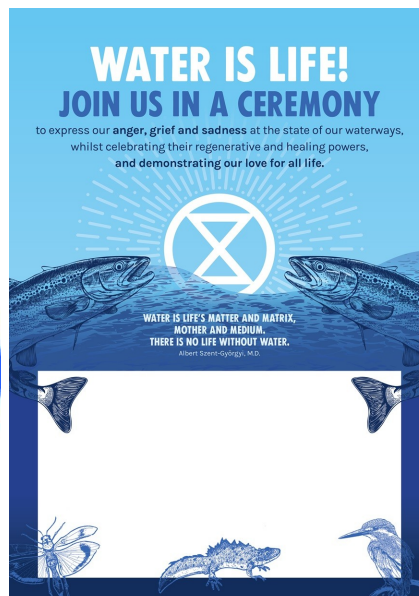

WATER IS LIFE!

This is an invitation to join a ceremony around our local waterways, to raise awareness, to learn how to protect our waters. We come from water, our bodies are 60% water and our brains are 80%. Humans are a part of nature not apart from nature. Water is crucial for all life, we must honour it.

Throughout history, we have always held ceremonies and rituals. They are our means of celebrating, marking moments, or making sense of the world we experience. For example, events such as naming ceremonies, funerals and unions (marriages), or more frequently, a football match or gig, are all a form of ritual where we share our feelings. Ceremonies have a more sacred element and gentle nature, they can include performance and express a sense of mourning or appreciation.

We're inviting you to an event to reaffirm our relationship with our local water. This might encompass our anger, sadness, awareness and care, and it can inspire change and our best intentions for this relationship from now on.

Using ceremonies to honour our water can include contributions of stories, myths, music and song, shared meditations, and spoken word. They can be as simple or complex as the community needs. Ceremonies, done well, leave lifelong lasting memories and therefore permanent good effects.

What would you like to bring to this ceremony we make together? You could be a witness or make your contribution. Please join this ceremony to act now on behalf of life.



Promote

Vows

Commit to Water for Life!

To commit to water wedding vows, you can draw inspiration from **the symbolism of water** – its flow, depth, and ability to cleanse and renew – to craft vows that reflect your love and commitment. Consider incorporating phrases about the ever-flowing nature of your love, the strength and resilience of water, or the peace and serenity it can bring.

Flow and Continuity

Compare your love to a river, always moving forward, ever-changing, yet always returning to the source. This can represent the enduring and evolving nature of your relationship.

Depth and Mystery

Use language that speaks to the deep and mysterious aspects of the ocean, emphasizing the hidden depths of your love and the adventures you will share.

Cleansing and Renewal

Highlight water's ability to cleanse and renew, symbolizing the fresh start and purification that marriage brings.

Resilience and Strength

Refer to the power of water to shape landscapes and withstand storms, symbolizing your ability to face challenges together.

Writing Your Own Vows

When writing your own vows, consider what you love most about water, how it's impacted your life, and your hopes for the future. Consider specific examples of your relationship and the promises you want to make. Start with an opening that addresses the water body directly, then share your feelings, make your promises, and conclude with a heartfelt closing.

Tips for Writing and Delivering Vows

- Be authentic and sincere.
- Speak from the heart.
- Practise beforehand to ensure a smooth delivery.
- Consider your audience and choose language that is appropriate for your ceremony.
- Remember that your vows are a personal expression of your love and commitment.

River Inspired Vows

Focus on Personhood of the River:

"I vow to love you as deeply as the river, with all its beauty, its power, and its sense of adventure. Like the water that flows ever-forward, my love for you will be unyielding, unstoppable, and unending."

"With the sound of the water rushing by and the warmth of the sun on our skin, I promise to love you with all my heart. I vow to be your partner in all of life's adventures, and to share with you all of life's joys and sorrows."

"As we stand here by the river, I am reminded of the flow of life and the power of nature. With you by my side, I feel supported, loved, and filled with joy. I vow to cherish and honor you for all the days of my life."

Focus on the river's journey:

"Like the river, our love will carve its own path, sometimes gently, sometimes with force, but always moving forward, together."

"Just as a river never stops flowing, my love for you will be a constant, a steady current in our lives."

"We will navigate the rapids and bask in the calm pools, just like a river flowing to the sea."

Highlighting interconnectedness:

"As tributaries feed the river, my life is enriched by your presence, and I promise to be a source of strength for you as well."

"Like the river's connection to the ocean, our lives are intertwined, and I pledge to honour and cherish this bond."

"We are two rivers flowing towards the same sea, each with our own unique course, but destined to be one."

Emphasizing enduring presence:

"I promise to be your constant companion, your steady shore, through all the seasons of life, just as a river is always there."

"Our love will be like a river, ever-changing yet eternally present, a source of life and beauty."

"Just as a river shapes the landscape, our love will shape our lives, creating a beautiful and enduring testament to our commitment."

Traditional Christian Wedding Vows

'I, (name), take you, (name) to be my wife/husband/partner to have and to hold from this day forward; for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy law. In the presence of God I make this vow.'

Here, the wedding ring is placed on the finger: 'With this ring I thee wed, with my body I thee worship, and with all my worldly goods I thee endow: in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.'

The vows according to the service in Common Worship - followed since 2000 - are as follows:

'I, (name), take you, (name), to be my wife/husband/partner, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy law. In the presence of God I make this vow.'

More Inspiration & Ideas

The Power of Celebrating Water

Connection through water, with nature and each other, fosters well-being, through a regenerative and healing relationship, encouraging the flow and exchange of energy and knowledge. Consider making more of an impact by following some of these suggestions:

- Actively cultivate a sense of curiosity/care/communication/collaboration through creative interactions with the river (e.g. song, music, poetry, arts and crafts workshops or installations).
- Demonstrate vulnerability: create an impactful ceremony to demonstrate your anger, grief and sadness at the state of our waterways and your love for all life.
- Explore: physically get to know your local waters (the source, wells and tributaries) to engage with and care for your local waterway.
- Research: look at wider connections, the history of the local waters and collect local stories and images.
- Consider your catchment area, sewage treatment works, landfills and other sources of pollution. How can you bring awareness of all the different sources of pollution to this waterway?
- Presence: Be present around waterways and feel the energy and power they can give to you.

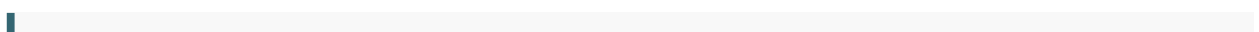

Fresh water is precious and finite | All life depends on it

Our waterways are the arteries and veins of the earth. If we pollute those waterways, life will die.



“Nothing on this planet had so forcefully hammered into her the ultimate value of water. Not the water-sellers, nor the dried skins of the natives ...
